Lifepath -Eric Liddell

Sue Brown Schools Development Worker for the Midlands writes...

Lifepath provides an opportunity for Key Stage 2 pupils to learn about Christians from history. Being the year of the Olympics, 2012 gives us an incredible opportunity to look at the Lifepath of one Olympian athlete who put God before everything, even his dreams of winning Olympic gold.

In June last year, a Lifepath event in Rotherham was based on athlete and committed Christian Eric Liddell. In the 1924 Paris Olympics, Liddell was famously known for deciding not to run on the Sabbath and thereby losing the chance of an almost certain gold

medal in the 100metres. He went on to win the 400 metres whilst holding a piece of paper which had 1 Samuel 2: 20 on it - "Those who honour me, I will honour them."

However, Eric's life didn't end there and he turned down the

opportunity for fame and fortune to become a missionary in China. At the outbreak of the Second World War he refused to return to the safety of Eng-

answers your questions.

O. What is The Games?

A. The Games is a one day school-based activity programme ideal for Key Stage 2 that mixes fun and activity with educational curriculum-based sessions such as PE, RE, PHSE, Art, Geography etc. It has been developed with More Than Gold as a response to the London 2012 Games and reflects the specific context of working in schools and so is suitable for schools and pupils of all faiths or none.

Q. How does it work?

A. Participants are divided into groups (countries) of about 10-15 pupils each of which has a Country Captain (volunteer) who stays with that group all day. There is an Opening and Closing Ceremony (Assembly) to launch and conclude the day for everyone. In between, the countries rotate around three zones – Discovery (RE& PHSE), Creative (Art, Geography etc) and Sports (PE). Throughout the day, the groups are earning points and the Gold Medals are given out in the Closing World War he refused to return to the safety of England but rather went to help his brother care for the poor and sick. After being captured and held in a Japanese prisoner of war camp, Liddell gave his free pass out of the camp to a pregnant woman and remained a prisoner. He died a short time after this sacrificial act.

Rotherham's Lifepath covered the breadth of Eric's life including workshops on: Chinese Writing, Fair Play Games, an overview of his Lifepath, puppetry (focussing on helping the less well off in the world) and a prayer workshop. We were also honoured to have a woman who, as a child, had been at the same prisoner of war camp as Eric. She was interviewed by the children and spoke of how Eric was "like Jesus" to all he met.

The event was so positively received that within days we had received invitations to do five Lifepath events on Eric Liddell this year!

If you would like to run a Lifepath on Eric Liddell to coincide with the Olympics then all the materials used by Rotherham Lifepath are available to be used and adapted. Q. Why choose The Games?

A. From a school's perspective, The Games is a great way to involve pupils in a day of fun, activity and value -based learning and from a church perspective The Games can act as a catalyst to build/develop/enhance a meaningful relationship between church and school. The day is based around Christian values and concepts and, in educationally appropriate ways, explores the Christian faith with the pupils involved. It's also great fun and easy to run because the school already has most of the resources you need.

Q. What is the hope?

A. The hope is that a number of teams / churches will run The Games to deliver a one day programme in one local school OR a series of one day programmes based in a number of local schools

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
